Walk-A-Thon Huge Success!

From April 10 to April 30, BEACON hosted a Virtual Walk for Literacy. Participants registered to walk, run, or bike as individuals or together with teams. Our initial goal was to raise \$20,000. We more than doubled that number, finishing with a grand total of \$42,275.76. We had 89 walkers and 13 teams participate. We also welcomed 233 new donors to the BEACON family. Over \$11,000 was raised in corporate sponsorships. BEACON HONORED

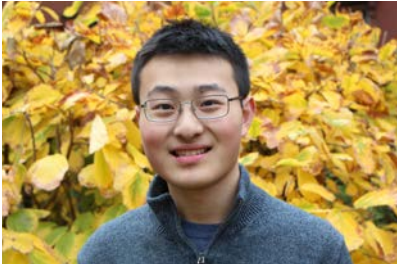

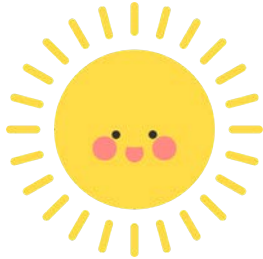

Summer at BEACON

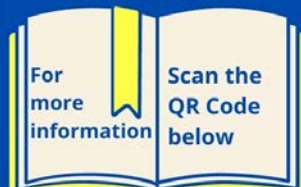
